HENRY DAVID THOREAU was born in Concord in 1817 and never strayed far or long from it. A friend of Emerson and Margaret Fuller, he was a rugged individualist endowed with typical Yankee shrewdness and wit. He kept a journal from the age of 17 to his death at 44, but he is chiefly remembered for *Walden* and for his famous essay on "Civil Disobedience," written after he had been jailed for failing to pay his poll-tax to a State which supported slavery.

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
