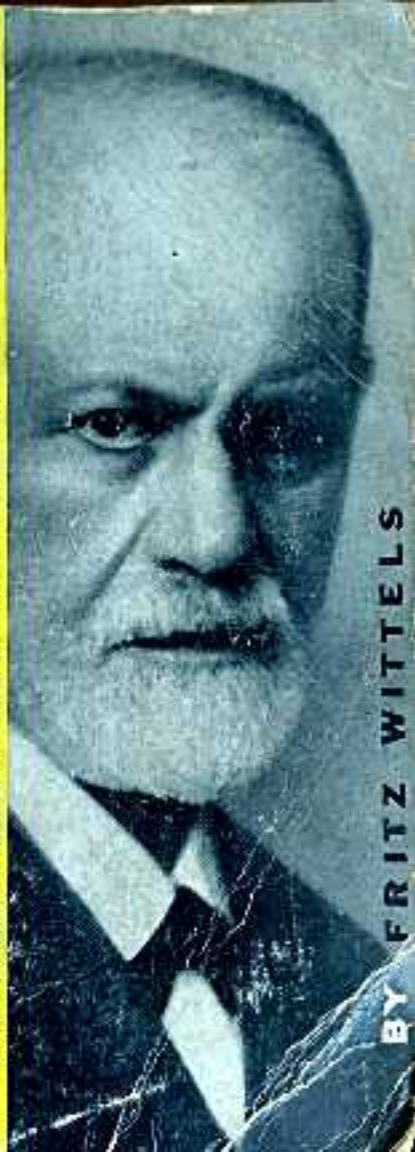

ABOUT THE AUTHOR

Dr. Fritz Wittels was born in Vienna and educated in medicine at that city's famous university. In 1907 he met Sigmund Freud and through him became intensely interested in psychoanalysis. During the years 1907 to 1914, he wrote several books embodying his psychoanalytic studies. His first book was a novel entitled *The Jeweler of Bagdad*. His second book, *The Sex Problem*, was a collection of essays, dealing especially with the psychology of women. Between the two World Wars, Dr. Wittels was a practicing psychiatrist, a member of the International Psychoanalytic Association, and, in New York, a professor at the Psychoanalytic Institute of the New School for Social Research. His other books include *Young Mothers* (1911), *All I or Love* (1912), *An End To Poverty* (1924), *The Technique of Psychoanalysis* (1926), *Set the Children Free* (1927, English edition 1933), *The World Without Jews* (1928) and *Critique of Love* (1929). Up to his death in 1950, Dr. Wittels continued to practice psychoanalysis in New York, taught at the New York Psychoanalytic Institute, and contributed many articles to various psychoanalytic and medical journals. His last book, *Sex Habits of American Women*, was published in 1951.
